St Chad's Church was designed by the Manchester architect Cecil Hardisty and built 1906-7. The church contains interesting stained glass windows, a Grade 11 listed organ built by Harrisons of Durham in 1906, and the local War Memorial.

S. Sergeant GERALD HENRY CHARLES WATKINS.


1128063 Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. Wireless Operator.
Died 17.05.1943. Aged 22

The two sons of Clifford Henry Watkins and Mabel Katherine Watkins.

They are buried in the churchyard of St. Peter, Stoke Goldington, Buckinghamshire, as are their parents. The brothers are also commemorated in a window in the south aisle of St Chad`s by the celebrated designer Geoffrey Webb.

The Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve was formed in July 1936 to supplement the Royal Auxiliary Air Force which had been formed in 1925. Recruits were men who had been accepted for part time training as Pilots, Observers and Wireless operators, to provide a reserve in the event of war. 172 Squadron was formed 1942 at RAF Chivenor, Devon, as part of Coastal Command.

Additional Information: Harold William Brown was a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists, and was organist at St Chad`s Church. Son of William John and Harriett Brown of 21 Birch Lane, Longsight, and brother of Lillian, Janet, Ernest Robert and Gertrude Brown. He was killed in action at Ypres.

Near the front of the organ is a brass tablet inscribed :-

IN LOVING MEMORY OF
HAROLD WILLIAM BROWN FRCO
3rd. BN. WORCESTER REGIMENT
ORGANIST OF THIS CHURCH SINCE 1909
KILLED IN ACTION AT YPRES
12TH AUGUST 1917
AGED 32 YEARS

Ypres occupied a strategic position during WW1 because it stood in the path of Germany's planned sweep across Belgium and in to France. The third Battle of Ypres, also known as the Battle of Passchendaele (21st July to 6th November 1917), resulted in half a million casualties to both sides

THE HIGGS BOSON EVENING

My thanks to everyone who helped make the Higgs Boson evening on 1st August such a success. Over 70 people turned up for what by common consent was a most stimulating and interesting evening. The occasion raised over £200, sufficient to cover the costs of the new pump for the church cellar. I'm grateful to Dr Fletcher for his help in selecting and showing the illustrations for the talk and to all who served the refreshments and helped make our many guests so welcome. As well as visitors from other congregations there were also members present from Menorah Synagogue, the Cathedral and the Manky Poets.

But we were especially grateful to Professor John Dainton, a particle physicist, for taking so ably the question and answer session after the talk. With his gifts for clarity and simplicity many who came expecting to be totally lost left feeling that they had grasped what it was all about. Professor Dainton is one of the physicists working at CERN who helped finally to track down the elusive boson.

So what is the Higgs Boson? It's about the world we live in: the world of 'stuff'! All stuff is made of atoms and those atoms in turn are made even smaller 'stuff', some of which, like 'electrons', 'protons' and 'neutrons' are 'particles' we've all heard of. These make up the stuff of our everyday physical world. But, in addition to these and other particles, there are also forces like gravity and magnetism that are needed to complete the picture. Except that they don't quite! They don't explain, for example, why 'stuff' has 'mass', or why, in the presence of gravity like the earth's, mass is experienced as 'weight.'

One theory, that of the British physicist, Peter Higgs, is that in addition to the forces we know about, like gravity, there is another, hidden force, an unsuspected, undetected field, the Higgs Field. To detect that field and the boson, or force carrying particle associated with it, it needed the Large Hadron Collider at CERN in Switzerland and the ingenuity of thousands of scientists and engineers. Their search

was the story behind our evening.

And what has all this to do with the Christian faith? Only that the Higgs Boson is a window into creation, and God as Creator is part of our faith.

This Month's Saint Elizabeth Fry 1780-1845 12th October

Prison Reformer.

n the old Book of Common Prayer our church remembered the lives of only six or so saints each month; while now, with Common Worship, this number has quadrupled, with many of those celebrated being not only modern but also members of other churches.

A further change has been that those in the old calendar were honoured chiefly for the 'holiness' of their lives, while those added recently are celebrated more for their Christian courage or humanitarianism, as is the case with this month's commemoration of Elizabeth Fry. This interesting theological shift from holiness to morality deserves more discussion than it's so far received.

Elizabeth Fry, 'Betsy' to her family and friends, was born into a wealthy Quaker banking family, the Gurneys. Catherine, her mother, was a Barclay, of Barclay's bank fame.

When she was 18, Elizabeth heard the American Quaker preacher, William Savery and as a result became concerned for the plight of the sick, poor and those in prison. She began a Sunday School for poor children and began collecting clothes for poor relief.

In 1800, she married Joseph Fry, a family banker friend who was also a Quaker. They had eleven children, nine of whom survived childhood. In 1812, at a friend's suggestion she visited Newgate Jail and was appalled at the brutalisation and conditions of the prisoners, especially the women, many of whom had their children with them. After visiting other prisons and spending the night there she invited aristocratic friends to see prison life for themselves.

As well as encouraging women prisoners to improve their lives, sewing and reading the Bible, she began a school for the children and lobbied parliament through her brother -in-law who was an MP.

A woman of tremendous energy, Elizabeth founded the British Ladies Society for Promoting the Reformation of Female Prisoners, the first national women's organisation in the country. In 1840, she also began a nurses' training school which later supplied Florence Nightingale with nurses in the Crimea. Among those who supported her work were Queen Victoria, Robert Peel and king Frederick William IV of Prussia. In 2001, the Bank of England issued a £5 note showing her reading to prisoners at Newgate. Fry is a Christian Quaker worthy of Anglican commemoration in our church's prayers.
