'Lord Babe, if Thou art He
We sought for patiently,

But I have only brought
Myrrh; no wise afterthought

Where is Thy court? Instructed me

Hither may prophecy and star resort; To gather pearls or gems, or choice to see

Men heed not their report.' – Coral or ivory.'

'Bow down and worship, righteous man: 'Not least thine offering proves thee wise:

This Infant of a span

For myrrh means sacrifice,

Is He man sought for since the world began!'

And He that lives, this Same is He that dies.'

Then, Lord, accept my gold, too base a thing

Then here is myrrh: alas, yea woe is me

For Thee, of all kings King.'

That myrrh befitteth Thee.'

'Lord Babe, despite Thy youth Myrrh, frankincense, and gold:

I hold Thee of a truth

Good-will doth bring

But wherefore dost Thou keep so mean a state, A Lamb, the innocent likeness of this King
