

About St Chad St Chad was born around 634 in Northumbria and was ordained priest, possibly in Ireland around 660. The Bishop of York had died during a serious outbreak of plague in 664 and Chad was consecrated to take his place. In the chaos caused by the plague a replacement bishop, Wilfred, had already been consecrated in France. He returned to York and in 669 replaced Chad as Bishop of York. Soon after Chad became Bishop of Lichfield where he died on 2 March 672.

Big changes in mission and ministry in Ladybarn, Withington and Didsbury

You may have heard about a "team ministry" bringing together Emmanuel and St James, Didsbury, St Paul's Withington, St Nick's and St Chad's. The parishes will have their own churchwardens and PCCs but not their own rector as they have in the past. The five churches will be served by three full-time priests plus, from time to time, one or more curates (apprentice priests).

How might this work? Who will hold things together, knows who to contact and notices who hasn't been at church and may need a visit or a call? This role once entirely rested with the Priest – now, in a different world, the Diocese is proposing that each church appoint a **focal leader.** This person, who might be a churchwarden, sidesperson, Authorised Lay Minister or other volunteer (lay or ordained) is a go-to person, helping the congregation in any way they can and drawing people alongside them. Experience and research in other dioceses suggest that the presence of a focal leader in church life is linked with increased growth of all kinds.
